City of Copperhill Resolution #2-18-25-01

A Resolution of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Copperhill, Tennessee, authorizing the Mayor to enter into an Intergovernmental Agreement with Fannin County, Georgia for the paving of the portion of West Tennessee Avenue within the jurisdiction of the City of Copperhill.

WHEREAS, the City of Copperhill, Tennessee (the "City"), recognizes the need for infrastructure improvements within its jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, a portion of West Tennessee Avenue lies within the City of Copperhill and is in need of paving to ensure the safety and convenience of its residents and visitors; and

WHEREAS, Fannin County, Georgia, has the necessary resources and capability to complete the paving work on the portion of West Tennessee Avenue located within the City of Copperhill; and

WHEREAS, the City of Copperhill and Fannin County desire to enter into an intergovernmental contractual agreement to facilitate the paving of the aforementioned roadway in a cost-effective and efficient manner; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of the City and its residents to authorize the Mayor to execute the intergovernmental contract with Fannin County for this project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Copperhill Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Copperhill, Tennessee, as follows:

SECTION 1. The Mayor of the City of Copperhill is hereby authorized to enter into an intergovernmental contract with Fannin County, Georgia, for the purpose of paving the portion of West Tennessee Avenue located within the City of Copperhill, in accordance with the terms and conditions outlined in the attached contract, which is incorporated herein by reference.

SECTION 2. The City Recorder is directed to maintain a copy of the executed contract as part of the City's official records.

An Ordinance of the City of Copperhill, Tennessee altering Paid Holidays..

WHEREAS, the City of Copperhill, Tennessee, provides certain benefits to its employees; and

WHEREAS, the City needs to provide adequate holidays for employees; and

WHEREAS, the City of Copperhill desires to be a competitive employer, working to attract and retain the best employees available, and it is not possible to do this without providing a competitive benefits package

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Copperhill Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Copperhill, Tennessee , that:

Section 1: Section 4, Part A of the City of Copperhill, TN Personnel Policies are hereby amended by adding Good Friday, Juneteenth (June 19th), and December 26th to the list of official paid holidays for full-time employees.

Section 2: BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its final passage, the public welfare requiring it.

City of Copperhill Resolution #2-18-25-02

A Resolution of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Copperhill, Tennessee authorizing the City of Copperhill, Tennessee to enter into a contract with Todd Dilbeck for Professional Services Upon Completion of Successor Training.

WHEREAS, the City of Copperhill, Tennessee, requires the services of an independent contractor to assist with wastewater treatment plant operations and training, infrastructure projects, and compliance reporting; and

WHEREAS, Todd Dilbeck is qualified and willing to provide such services to the City of Copperhill, Tennessee; and

WHEREAS, the contract shall be for a term of twelve (12) months at a rate of \$1,200 per month; and

WHEREAS, the contractor shall perform the following duties:

- Monitor the City SCADA system to ensure tank levels are properly maintained.
- Perform the state monthly operating report (MOR).
- Collect and deliver bacterial samples to the state-certified facility in Etowah, Tennessee (mileage not to be paid by the City).
- Oversee the ARCA project for the City's sewer lift station upgrade.

WHEREAS, the City has reviewed the terms and conditions of the proposed contract and finds it to be in the best interest of the City; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Title 1, Chapter 2, Section 1-202 of The Copperhill Municipal Code, the City is authorized to enter into agreements for professional and contractual services; and

WHEREAS, the execution of the contract is contingent upon the successful training of Mr. Dilbeck's successor, with the City agreeing that the successor is prepared to assume the duties previously held by Mr. Dilbeck;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Copperhill Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Copperhill, Tennessee:

- 1. That the Mayor is hereby authorized to enter into a contract with Todd Dilbeck for the provision of the above-described services, in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in the contract, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A, upon the successful completion of training by Mr. Dilbeck's successor and the City's agreement that the successor is ready to assume the duties.
- 2. That the City Attorney shall review and approve the final terms of the contract to ensure compliance with all applicable laws and regulations.
- 3. That the City Recorder is authorized to encumber and expend funds as necessary for the fulfillment of this contract, subject to budgetary appropriations.

This Resolution takes effect immediately upon its passage, the public welfare requiring it.

City of Copperhill Resolution #2-18-25-03

A Resolution of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Copperhill, Tennessee to amend the City's garbage collection schedule.

WHEREAS, the City of Copperhill, Tennessee currently provides garbage collection services two days per week; and

WHEREAS, the cost of providing garbage collection services twice per week has placed an excessive financial burden on the City; and

WHEREAS, the City seeks to implement cost-saving measures while maintaining effective waste management services for its residents;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Copperhill Board of Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Copperhill, Tennessee, as follows:

SECTION 1. Effective the first week of March 2025, the City of Copperhill shall modify its garbage collection schedule from two (2) days per week to one (1) day per week.

SECTION 2. The designated collection day shall be Thursday of each week.

SECTION 3. Residents shall be limited to a maximum of six (6) bags of garbage per collection.

SECTION 4. The City shall notify residents of these changes through public announcements, postings on the City's official website, and other appropriate communication channels.

This Resolution shall take effect the first week of March 2025, the public welfare requiring it.



PROGRAM OVERVIEW

ThreeStar assists communities with connecting stakeholders and partners to strengthen community capacity and to implement actionable projects. In January 2025, TNECD will allocate \$6 million in rural economic opportunity funding to expand the ThreeStar program, which has been praised for its promotion of community development and flexible grant opportunities.

ELIGIBLE GRANTEES

ThreeStar Certified counties, cities/towns, economic development organizations, main street organizations, chambers of commerce, and qualified entrepreneur support organizations within certified counties.

FUNDING OVERVIEW

Grants up to \$1 million for governmental entities in distressed counties and up to \$250,000 for local government, non-profit and community partners for projects that align with community goals.

TIMELINE | PROGRAM KICKOFF WINTER 2025

Competitive applications are accepted on a rolling basis to be awarded quarterly. Distressed county applications accepted in February. Other applications accepted in June.


THREESTAR CERTIFICATION PROCESS OVERVIEW

BEFORE THE THREESTAR MEETING

- 1. Revise County Asset Inventory.
- 2. Identify and recruit ThreeStar Taskforce members.
- 3. Hold a TNECD-facilitated meeting to develop ThreeStar priority goals and/or send existing community strategic or master plans to be considered for approval.
- 4. Submit Joint Economic and Community Development Board (JECDB) meeting minutes.

AFTER THE THREESTAR MEETING

- 5. Edit and revise any draft goals with ThreeStar Taskforce members to meet SMART standards.
- 6. Develop all action steps and timelines for each of the six (6) SMART goals.
- 7. Complete ThreeStar certification application by entering all information into Smart Simple.
- 8. Complete ThreeStar grant application by entering all information into SmartSimple.

Grant application opens for distressed counties.

Due date for all counties to upload into the SmartSimple system.

☐ FEBRUARY 1 - APRIL 30, 2025

Open period for at-risk and all other counties to hold a local TNECD-facilitated community conversation with ThreeStar Taskforce Members for goal development. Counties have the option to submit county plans (by Feb. 1, 2025) for review/approval to use for guiding goal development. If the submitted plan does not meet TNECD approval, the community is required to schedule and host a local TNECD-facilitated community conversation during this period.

□ JUNE 1, 2025

Due date for all counties to upload into the SmartSimple system:

- Joint Economic and Community Development Board (JECDB)
 meeting minutes and interlocal agreement defining the local JECDB
 (TCA 6-58-114) or state approved sufficiently-similar organization.
- Three (3) priority long-term goals and three (3) priority short-term goals along with activity steps and timeline submitted for each goal written in SMART format.

□ JUNE 1, 2025

Grant application opens for all eligible applicants.

□ JULY 1, 2025

Eligible communities who meet the requirements receive two-year certification.
